Older Men are Dreaming!

As we come to the conclusion of this "Year of the Priest", which Pope Benedict had asked to be observed throughout the world, we continue to look at the life of St. John Mary Vianney, whom the Pope has given us as the Patron Saint of all priests. As we look back 150 years to the times in which the Cure of Ars lived, it is very striking how similar his days were to ours today. The Catholic Church in France at that time was suffering from the effects of the French Revolution – or really from the so called – "enlightenment" (which was anything but enlightened). The cultural, social and political climate was very much like the atmosphere we find in the United States, and in the

Fr. Francis Martin teaches that we are still deeply affected by the pagan secularization which gradually came about as a result of the "Enlightenment." Our Catholic people are surrounded by, and are suffering from, the effects of this secularization of our American culture. Pope John XXIII's encyclical "Sacerdotii Nostri Primordia" (From the Beginning of Our Priesthood), written in 1959 to mark the 100th Anniversary of St. John Vianney's death, spoke of the "unbridled"

whole world, in 2010.

looseness and spirit of lust" that he saw in the world at that time. What would he think about the world we live in today?

Our times have not perhaps seen as dramatic a repudiation of the faith as in France after the revolution, when they were lining up bishops and priests before firing squads. But we have seen, just in the past few months, the media; with no concern for accuracy or objective reasoning - predict the inevitable collapse of Pope Benedict's papacy, and perhaps the end of the Catholic Church as a whole. And many people, including many Catholics, begin to accept what the "infallible" New York Times presents as "truth." The secularization of human society has continued at a swift pace since the days John XXIII.

I am reminded of the example of a frog being cooked in a pot. If he would be thrown into scalding water, he would immediately jump out to escape, but if he is placed in cold water in a pot, and then the heat is gradually turned up – he doesn't notice it until he is "cooked." Hasn't our American culture been "cooked" slowly in the secular climate that has been so prevalent? What is wrong is said to be right, and what is good is said to be evil! This is happening in so many aspects of our common life, in

morality, in politics, in business and the media. We need to see the reality of where our culture is today. But we also need to see how the Lord in our time has "opened the flood gates of heaven and of mercy", as Saint Faustina has told us.

Just look at the ways that the Lord Jesus showed His grace and mercy in the life of John Vianney. As we reflect on the life of our Patron Saint, it will help us see more clearly how the Lord has been pouring out His Holy Spirit in our times, and how He wants to do so especially for His priests. John Vianney is exactly the model each of us priests needs today. The effectiveness of the ministry of the Cure of Ars came from prayer, which for him always meant coming before the Lord Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. How he loved just being there before Him. John Vianney's awareness of the Eucharist as the Center of life brought him those spiritual gifts and qualities – humility and openness - which made him an incredible channel of God's grace to the people he served.

Pope John XXIII said in his encyclical that "we attribute too much to the effectiveness of external activities...we embrace the hustle and bustle. It annoys our minds to turn away from external affairs." Again this is what the Pope saw 50 years ago. What would he think of ...continued on page 3



Some priests simply fulfill their duties in survival mode, trying to keep everybody happy in the parish and paying the bills. The largeness of Christ and his mission have been squeezed into a cubbyhole of a peaceful survival.

An evangelical author by the name of J. B. Phillips wrote a book called <u>Your God is Too Small</u>. Perhaps a corollary theme was addressed in this Year for Priests: *Your Call is Too Small*. Hopefully, one of the fruits of this year was a sloughing off of lethargy and a renewed awakening to the call of Jesus Christ to "make disciples of all the nations..." Perhaps more than ever our world needs, "heralds of hope, reconciliation and peace."

our TV, internet, cell phone, I-pod saturated world of today? We live in this world, and it affects us priests just as much as all the rest of the Catholic faithful. We find it difficult to pray, to quiet our minds. That is why the Lord has given us this particular call, through the blessing of the Fraternity of Priests and its "Visitation message," to pray - at least one hour a day, preferably before the Blessed Sacrament.

Praising God - in prayer, in

music, in expressing our worship out loud, in praying and singing in tongues – is a gift God gives us to enable us to come into His presence, quieting our distractions more quickly, bringing us out of ourselves, to bring us into "His throne room." The Holy Spirit has blessed His Church with a rediscovery of that charism spoken about in Paul's letters, praying in a language beyond our mental efforts - the Holy Spirit praying in us. This has been such a great gift to me and my brothers in Fraternity here in Pittsburgh, as we come together. Would that all our brother priests might experience this gift. I believe there is truth in seeing that the neglect of prayer; and the lack of true "fraternity" among priests, contributed to the moral problems for some of our brothers - in the 70's and 80s, which have been brought to light in these past few years. Prayer – and Fraternity - is the key. And I know for myself, after many years - that prayer, as well as Fraternity, is something I am always learning. It is something I am always "practicing."

We as priests were pretty much trained, in the 60's, 70's and 80's

that good ministry, good preaching, would flow from your intelligence, from your studies, your speaking skills, and good stories and jokes. All of these things are good. But the effectiveness of John Vianney's ministry flowed from his prayer. When the people heard his preaching, they were touched by the Lord. His Bishop at the time said about John: "I don't know if he is learned but I know that heavenly light shines in him." The Cure can show us priests that, as we pray, as we spend time with the Lord every day, and hear His Word -and then speak that Word in our homilies we will touch people's hearts; and the Lord will have prepared their hearts to hear the Word. John Vianney shows us that it is not the natural gifts of speech, wit, or charm which brings the Truth, but rather, it is the more we are filled with Jesus. As Pope John said - "a priest filled with Jesus will have no problem bringing Him to others."

John Vianney's prayer led him to celebrate the Eucharist with awe. He saw the Mass as the summit of life – it was where His holiness came from. People were touched when he celebrated Mass. It was reported: "those surrounding John Vianney could feel something bursting forth from the depths of his inner life." As we pray and spend time with the Lord, the Holy Spirit can bring us to celebrate the Eucharist with interior and exterior devotion. It will happen. Vianney said: "be aware of Who you hold in your hand." The Eucharist can transform - beginning with you and me as the priest.

As this Year for the Priest concludes, we can thank the Lord

Jesus for the life and example of John Vianney. We can thank the Lord Jesus for what He is doing in our time – through the Fraternity of Priests. The Fraternity has been given to us to help each one of us to be the priest Jesus calls us to be. Each one of us is called to be a holy priest - every one of us. When we get discouraged, let us take to heart the words of the prophet Joel, and see that the Lord is "pouring out his Spirit on all humanity. Your old people will dream dreams and your young men will see visions."

Let us be aware of the great blessing the Lord is giving the Church in the young men who are being called to the priesthood today. These are men who "see visions", who have a deep desire for the spiritual life. I see them as men with devotion to the Eucharist and to Adoration.

As for us "older men", I believe He wants us to "dream dreams" – the dream that He will make us all "John Vianneys"- if we let Him. Let us ask for the prayers of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Mother of priests, to give us a desire to be holy priests. Finally, let us thank all those faithful people who pray for us – those who continue to support the Fraternity of Priests in so many ways. Please continue to pray for us - that we will allow the Lord Jesus to raise up more John Vianneys today - to serve you.
